Psalm 107:1 Give thanks to the Lord, for he is good; his faithful love endures forever.

Without a doubt, 2020 was filled with unexpected cancellations, disappointments, and heartbreak. Through all the closures, pivot to online everything, and social distancing, God was creating pathways to continue ministry and connection in unique ways.

In April, Village Kids launched a **weekly newsletter**, providing families with spiritual support, child development resources, and recommendations about how to have hard conversations with kids. The same month, we began using Orange Curriculum to offer developmentally appropriate online Bible lessons to all families with children ages preschool through fifth grade.

In June, Village Kids launched a portable ministry using the Village shuttle bus. Energetic and dedicated ministry partners loaded the shuttle with games, music, and fun every Wednesday for 6 weeks. The **Fun Bus Teams** brought joy and the love of Jesus to 20 families in 20 different neighborhoods around the Portland metro area. June also marked the month Love360 began. Over 30 families participated in loving others 360 degrees around them through outreach that touched families impacted by incarceration, homebound Village seniors, and first responders.

In September, Villagers began partnering with the production of our online bible lessons and are now participating weekly in our Sunday Experiences. October marked the launch of **AWANA** reimagined. Our Puggles and Truth and Training clubs meet online weekly, while our Cubbies and Sparks were assigned ministry partners who serve as coaches, prayer partners, and shepherds to our AWANA families. We had nearly the same number of students participating in reimagined AWANA as we did when we met in person. AWANA is thriving due to the dedication and faithfulness of our ministry partners.

November and December brought **Love360** partnerships with the Village Hispanic Fellowship and Village Pastoral Care Team in addition to finishing the year with an online family Christmas celebration, titled Jingle Jam. Forty-five families tuned into Jingle Jam to play games, learn about advent, and sing carols. Of course, we concluded the evening with Silent Night, by candlelight.

In a year when so many experienced tremendous hardship and tragedy, God used our Village Kids ministry to encourage families to lead spiritual conversations in their homes and with their neighbors as well as serve our community. We had the privilege of witnessing Village Kids and families love extravagantly over and over again. We cannot wait to see how God uses us for His glory in 2021.

God Sightings in 2020... A Personal Testimony



As I give a backward glance to this year, I give praise and glory to a faithful God who saw it all coming and continued to guide, bless, equip, and enable. Here are some "God sightings" observed this year, where I saw His hand at work, and where we are going forward.

Concerning pastoral care. I began the year by officially coming on staff as Assistant Director of Pastoral Care with the prayer that God would provide the director. While going through the logistics of coming on staff as a volunteer servant-leader, I looked around at Village to see what we had. What did I find? A gold mine of believers sold out to their walks of faith with the Lord and already serving Him in many capacities. I began to keep track of these areas with the intent to encourage these ministries and further enable them to be known and effective at Village. I had conversations with wonderful people. A Memorial Team was firmed up with people already skilled and experienced with what they had been doing at Village and only needed to reconfigure plans due to the retirement of Pastor Bob Walker in 2019.

Then came the pandemic. It was not possible to hold memorial services with receptions. Home visits and hospital visits came to a halt. We had to rethink how we could reach out to the elderly, lonely, hurting, and isolated around us.

This year, our **Visitation Team** encouraged the homebound through phone calls, emails, "porch visitation," and distributing gifts lovingly crafted by the children at Village. We prayed over the phone with people before surgeries and assisted with graveside services.

God also moved in the heart of **Jim Clementson** and implanted a desire to step alongside people in need. He didn't know what that meant but continued his IT job and courses at Western Seminary with the goal of a Master of Arts in Biblical and Theological Studies. By October, his job ended and a door opened for him to explore a calling to the ministry. I praise God for this answer to my prayer at the beginning of the year – for a Co-Director of Pastoral Care.

This coming year, we'll continue to gather information on pastoral care ministries at Village and publicize this list of help for Villagers and ways people may serve. God also placed on my heart a desire to help us be better prepared for end-of-life decisions either for ourselves or for parents entering those years of change and loss – housing, legal preparation, medical considerations, etc. I have full confidence in God's leading in this area.

Yes, God has been present and will be going forward.

On March 12, our church leaders decided to close the campus and move all worship services online for the next four weeks. Frankly, we struggled! To move from hardly online to **fully online** was a difficult switch. We began with four different services: Spanish, Korean, English, and Village Kids. We realized creating a new format for the digital world of worship would not just work better for our team, but would better connect the church to each other during these distanced times. Working from home, we asked different staff and Villagers to send in videos of them greeting the church, praying, reading announcements, or closing our service with a benediction. By Easter, it was apparent we needed to operate online for the foreseeable future. We recognized we didn't just need to survive, we needed to thrive. The Sunday service production team became the **Creative Worship Team**. Insil Kang, Paul Choi, lan Watts, Charlotte Bryan, and Dago Flores settled into weekly video production, constantly asking ourselves, "How can we bring the atmosphere of Village into the homes of our community?" and "How do we bring the multicultural church to the online realm?"

Our Village singers and musicians grew leaps and bounds this year. It isn't easy leading worship to an empty room, but their hard work paid off. We are so grateful for their dedication to worship and willingness to sing, smile, and praise in front of a camera. In August, the Creative Worship Team sat down to outline our future in digital ministry. We redesigned the look and layout of worship services. We dove into multilingual options, offering translated live streams and multicultural focused services. We asked, "What is the unique opportunity for our services in times of COVID-19?" A space was created to capture different worship styles and tell Villager stories. You may recognize now familiar elements: Prelude, Scripture reading, Story Time, Ministry Highlight, and symbolically lighting a candle together. We see the candle as a representation of Christ with us as we worship from our homes. It connects us as a church body, so we feel together even as we are physically apart. It is a symbol of hope. This year has been difficult for many of us in different ways, but we believe our hope in Christ will lead us through our darkest times. This new tradition came full circle, connecting with our long-term tradition of lighting candles while singing Silent Night in our Christmas Eve service.

We also took this opportunity to create a **dedicated, sacred space** that was specifically for filming the weekend content. An amazing group of staff and volunteers spent the last two weeks of August remodeling one of our Rita houses. We moved our new lighting and cameras into the space and created the studio that you now see during welcomes, sermons, and various other service elements. Also, after much planning and anticipation, the Sanctuary stage was painted darker. This makes the space more intimate and welcoming and makes controlling lighting for in-person or virtual events easier. Now, we are able to house larger bands and small choir groups, featuring more Villagers in our weekend services.

Across 46 weeks of COVID-19, our presence on social media has grown. We've published **330 videos** on YouTube: English, Korean, Mandarin, and Spanish services, ministry highlights, kids and youth videos, and recordings of online classes or churchwide meetings. We've gained subscribers from all over the world. The Hispanic Fellowship live streams from the church and The Korean Fellowship work together to translate the whole weekend service into Korean. In October, our Chinese Fellowship began translating the service into Mandarin, providing one of the few Mandarin language services in the Pacific Northwest. It is also being shared in China. with those who do not yet know Jesus.

As I look back at this past year, through all the ups and downs, the triumphs and the challenges, the successes and the "we'll get it next times".... I'm overwhelmed with gratitude for Villagers who stepped up and worshipped in a new way. I can only imagine the voices singing out in praise from homes all over the world. To everyone who participated in online services – every greeter, band member, prelude musician, scripture reader, Kid or Youth who led us in worship, every staff member, and the one in Heaven too – **thank you** for making this year of worshipping together one to remember.

Online worship services in four languages

Ever since the COVID-19 restrictions on large gatherings last March, there were quite a few changes to how Korean Fellowship (KF) did its ministry. We continued our meetings through **Zoom** and other online platforms. These included our Sunday Korean language worship service, Wednesday prayer meeting, and our Wednesday evening worship service. Pastor Paul Choi learned what was needed for producing worship videos, and through his efforts we started off well.

Although we no longer met through large gatherings, we still met in small group settings, and for that I was thankful. We had almost 230 KF members who attended small groups. They met faithfully with their small group brothers and sisters in person or through zoom in order to have fellowship, to encourage, and pray for another. We called these groups "sharing groups", because we shared our lives as we meditated on the Word of God. One of our KF members stated that she really appreciated how the community cared for her, prayed for her, and gave her advice with her business. With the love and care that she received from the group, she felt that it was a great decision to join her small group. It made her feel belonged. It was through the Sharing Group ministry that our KF members felt supported. It was through these experiences that allowed our KF members to remain active at Village in Christ throughout the year.

We also had another ministry based on a **one-to-one discipleship** training. The training is separated into three parts: Invitation to an Abundant Life, the First Step to an Abundant Life, and the Foundation of an Abundant Life. The program taught our members about the journey to attaining an abundant life in the gospel of the kingdom. It also equipped them to then train more individuals with the principles taught. Many of our KF members participated because of their desire and need to have fellowship with others, and about forty members have finished this discipleship training. They spent two or three hours in the program sharing their lives based on what they learned from the materials. Some even spent four or five hours each meeting. I heard from several KF members that the discipleship program was so good that they wanted to do the program with a relative, a friend, and their neighbors. The discipleship program has expanded beyond Village!

We were privileged to work with our **Local Missions** to serve our community. We volunteered or provied items for The Distribution Center, dental clinic, medical clinic, the Red Cross Blood Drive, etc. We were blessed to be a part of the ministry. This is one of the benefits of a Multicultural Church, and the Korean Fellowship embraces it.

We are part of a single body at Village, and it is our prayer that the eternal Father will fill us with rich blessings in this year 2021.

MISSIONS AND OUTREACH

Villagers, because of you:

Families with disabled loved ones, who are especially stressed and economically challenged during quarantine restrictions, were encouraged with gifts of diapers and clothing. Such a seemingly little thing became a huge encouragement to struggling families and those who work with them.


Employees with **Women, Children and Infants** were stunned by the generous donations of diapers, causing them to ask, "Why are people at your church doing this? Why do they care for people they haven't met?" Relationships were built with people from different faith backgrounds. Food and supplies were distributed in Jesus' name to under-served communities in Multnomah and Washington County. Dozens of Children's Connect Kits and **New Beginning Bags** were donated to help families impacted by incarceration.

Nineteen Oregon fire departments received donated gloves worth \$100,000. With budget reductions and historic fires, department chiefs came to Village with great appreciation for the generous gift. One fire chief recalled his experience as a teenager at a Village Raft Rally, the positive memories of the people he met, and the message he heard. People at four fire evacuation zones received blankets, gloves, hats, hygiene supplies and water during the most uncertain days of their lives. Homeless teenagers received food and hygiene supplies when homeless shelters shut down making it difficult to receive help.

Washington County Sheriff officers were provided a safe place to rest at Village when restaurants shut down and tensions were high. People found relief from dental pain and the burden of expensive dental care through Village Dental Clinics. Blood donors who lived in our Village neighborhood for many years were greeted warmly and received their first tour of our Village campus during Red Cross events. Immigrants kept their legal status when required medical exams were provided for free by Village doctors through our federally licensed Village Medical Clinic.

Pastors in **India** fed their families despite losing their income when churches were closed after we transferred funds to assist them. Homes were rebuilt in **Lebanon** following the port explosion disaster and Syrian refugees continue to receive life-saving food and the Good News of Jesus.

Our parking lot was used by our partners and 360 people received **COVID tests** relieving stress and preventing spread as infected people were able to quarantine to protect others. Twenty six long-term workers were empowered to live out the gospel globally working among vulnerable, and unreached people groups.



God did many things through our Distribution Center since it started in May 2020. With your help, we helped families, minorities, COVID-19 positive families, people who lost their job or homes, people who have mental health struggles, and everyone in between. Each week provided something new. Here are some things that we couldn't have done without you:

- · We received over 60,000 donations through the community.
- · 583 local Refugee families received food.
- · 19 First Responder and Search & Rescue crews received PPE's.
- We participated in 4 evacuation zones, giving people clothing, blankets, hygiene items, and food.
- We helped 10 other churches provide for their congregations and community including Pacific Islander & African American churches throughout Oregon.
- · We helped 12 big organizations receive food & basic supplies.
- We gave out 36,225 diapers this year to organizations, families, single parents, and homeless.
- We gave 30 turkey baskets to families for Thanksgiving, and combined that
 with other churches that made 159 baskets for a ministry that lost corporate
 sponsors due to economic downtown. That fed 1,000 people throughout Portland
 for Thanksgiving!

It is your partnership & involvement that made this so successful. Thank you for making this year a little more hopeful for people in the middle of a pandemic.
